


Instructor Recertification

ARE WATERSPOUTS WATER TORNADOS?

At one time or another most boaters have seen a waterspout. They are pretty to watch and usually quite benign. Recently a waterspout hit a marina nearby my home and did considerable damage. Needless to say, I have developed a new level of respect for these anomalies of nature.

There are two types of waterspouts: fair weather and tornadic. Fair weather waterspouts form as their name implies and can exist on a bright sunny day. They have winds in the 50 mph range and usually remain over water. They will dissipate rapidly



when approaching land. Tornadic waterspouts are accompanied by severe thunderstorm activity and can have winds up to 150 mph. They can move out over water while maintaining a very high and harmful wind velocity.

Waterspouts are formed under conditions of warm temperatures and high humidity. That is why they are common in southern waters. They form along a dark base of cumulonimbus clouds and are caused by a vertical wind shear, which is a wind force that changes as it goes higher from the surface to the clouds. The waterspout is not a whirling column of water, but consists of cloud vapor which is tiny water droplets that swirl around. Fair weather waterspouts start at the water surface and work their way up to the cloud base, whereas the more dangerous tornadic waterspouts start at the cloud base and work their way downward.

Any waterspout seen on the water and/or approaching land needs to be treated with respect. You can never be certain what type of waterspout you are observing. They tend to move fairly slowly over the surface and can be very dangerous. Boaters should never try to navigate through a waterspout and should avoid difficulty by moving away from it at right angles. They have been known to suck up small animals, seaweed, saltwater, sea fauna, fish, and even a small boat or a human. There are recorded cases on land, in which raindrops were mingled with a surprise downfall of salt water, fish, seaweed, and all manner of other debris. If you experience such an event, you know you have just witnessed the demise of a waterspout.

You can learn more about waterspouts at the national weather service web site. The United States Power Squadrons® include sections on weather in its ABC Boating Class as well as in a number of seminars and an excellent Weather Course. Watch for these offerings from your local Power Squadron or contact the national website at www.usps.org. Such general information should be fun and learning about weather patterns can interesting while keeping you safe on the water.

Have fun and "stay safe, my friend!" As Power Squadron members always remind us: "Boating is fun...we'll show you how!"

Aboard the ms Nieuw Amsterdam,

On Sunday February 2nd 2014 365 USPS members along with 650 additional guests boarded the ms Niew Amsterdam in Ft. Lauderdale, FL for a week long voyage to the eastern Caribbean islands. The ms Niew Amsterdam is a 935 foot long ship capable of entertaining 2111 guests in royal fashion. The crew of 929 is capable of indulging your every need.

ms Niew Amsterdam is not quite as large as other cruise ships. With a gross tonnage of 87000 tons, 106 feet wide and her six diesel generators capable of producing 86000 horsepower for both prime and ships service power, she is quite capable. The prime propulsion is provided by 2 ABB Azipod electric drives each producing 17.6 megawatts of thrust. Both combined the total power for prime moving is 48,000 horsepower, and can move the ship at a respectable 23 Knots. Maneuverability is further enhanced by bow and stern thrusters. Fuel consumption is a miserly 33,500 gallons a day, or about 120 tons of fuel daily. The ship also produces 540,000 gallons of fresh water a day. Waste water treatment meets or exceeds municipal discharge regulations, and all garbage is stowed for disposal ashore.

At 1552 the ship pulled away from the pier, slightly ahead of schedule because all passengers were on board early, and while were escorted out of port by the Broward County Sheriff, all passengers participated in the mandatory muster drill.

The first night was spent finding our dinner seating, enjoying a fine meal, and a show in the ships lounge. The deck lights on the ship were extinguished at 0100, and the view of the night sky and the muted lights of the fading Florida coast made for a relaxing first evening at sea. The night sky always relaxes so almost every night was spent star gazing from the room veranda.

Monday was a day at sea, so the ship was alive with activity, whether pool side, at one of the many bars, in the ships lounge, or roaming the ships stores, spas, or exercise areas there was activity to keep everyone busy.

Tuesday we arrived in Grand Turk at 0749. A full day of shopping or other shore side activities were available for the pleasure of the ships guests. Some did the ATV tour, snorkeling, or swimming in the clear blue waters, or just sitting on the beach getting a tan. Shopping was also a big hit with shops such as Diamonds International, and Effy getting a lot of visitors. We departed Grand Turk at 1456 and set our sights on San Juan, Puerto Rico. That evening there was a USPS 100th

anniversary reception on the fantail of the ms Niew Amsterdam. The food, beverage and company were enjoyed by all.

"Wear Your Life Jacket!" A Slogan So Nice, They Are Using It Twice

he North American Safe Boating Campaign reminds us again this year: Boat Smart From the Start – Wear your Life Jacket!" Remember, it's called a "life" jacket for a reason – it just might save your life. Each year, nearly 90 percent of all recreational boating drowning victims are not wearing life jackets. This means that many of these deaths were preventable.

You probably heard it many times: "I don't need a life jacket, I can swim." But even an excellent swimmer can succumb to a combination of cold water and swift currents. Hitting an obstruction or sudden severe weather can quickly send people over board.

Think again. While you may think you have time to steady yourself and put on a life jacket in an emergency, you probably won't. Things happen too quickly. And if you are knocked unconscious before you hit the water, you will have nothing to keep you afloat.

If you find yourself in the water, don't be too quick to remove clothing. Soaked clothing won't weigh you down and may actually keep you warmer. However, it does restrict movement, and offers no buoyancy.

When putting on your lifejacket, be sure it fits properly. A jacket that is too loose may pull up around your face when you are in the water. Get a life jacket that fits you, and make all necessary adjustments. Always take extra care when checking a child's life jacket.

Make a habit of periodically testing your life jacket. Practice swimming with it on, learning it's characteristics. Practice putting on your life jacket while in the water. Consider attaching a whistle to it; this can come in handy if you are in the water and need to alert someone.


No matter how long or short your trip on the water will be, always put on your life jacket before you get on the boat. If you are wading offshore a life jacket will keep you afloat should you flip or find a sudden drop-off.

The next time you see a professional water demonstration – either civilian or military – notice that all participants wear a life jacket. If they need one, then so do you.

If you are still not convinced, then ask yourself one simple question – "What is my life worth?"

A Book by Gene Schnagl


At our member's meeting in Oct of 2011 Captain Gene Schnagl and his wife, Kathy (members of South Shore Yacht Club) gave



Advanced Piloting Course Description

As the 2014 boating season approaches (will it ever get here?), you will see fit to learn more about inland and coastal navigation after you completed the USPS Piloting Course. Here is a suggestion:

Advanced Piloting is the second in the sequence of USPS courses on navigation. It continues to build coastal and inland navigation skill, allowing the student to take on more challenging conditions – unfamiliar waters, limited visibility, and extended cruises. GPS is embraced as a primary navigation tool while adding radar, chartplotters, and other electronic navigation tools. As with Piloting, the course includes many in-class exercises, advancing the student's skills through hands-on practice and learning. Ten classes of two hours each normally are scheduled for presentation of this course. In addition the students have seven days to complete the open book exam. Topics covered include: •Review of skills learned in Piloting •Advanced positioning techniques such as advancing a line of position •Other electronics: radar, depth sounders, autopilots, chartplotters, laptop computer software, etc. •Hazard avoidance techniques using electronics (e.g., "keep out" zones in GPS) •Collision avoidance using radar and GPS •Working with tides: clearances, depth, effects of current •Piloting with wind and currents •The "Seaman's Eye" – simple skills for checking that one is on course

The pre-requisite for the Advanced Piloting Course is the Piloting Course.

Junior Navigation Course Description

Are you ready to add to your navigatioonal "tool kit" beyond your Advanced Piloting skills? Here's how:

Junior Navigation is the first in a two-part program of study in offshore navigation, followed by the Navigation course. It is designed as a practical "how to" course. Subject matter includes: •Precise time determination •Use of the Nautical Almanac •Taking sextant sights of the sun •Reducing sights to establish lines of position •Special charts and plotting sheets for offshore navigation •Offshore navigational routines for recreational craft

In Junior Navigation, the student will continue to use GPS as the primary position sensor, as they learned to do in Piloting and Advanced Piloting. However, the offshore environment poses many different elements for consideration by the Navigator. Ocean currents, wind, and sea state all affect a vessel's performance over the longer passages.

Also, visible terrestrial landmarks are no longer available to the navigator as reference points. In the Junior Navigation course, the student will learn to substitute celestial objects such as the sun as reference points. The course begins with the study of celestial navigation, teaching the student to take sights on the sun with a marine sextant and derive a line of position from that observation. Next, the student will apply the principles learned in Advanced Piloting, and plot a running fix from two sun sights taken about four hours apart. Once the student has learned the basics of celestial sight reduction, the course continues with planning, positioning, and checking one's position in the offshore environment, using both electronic and celestial tools.

The pre-requisite for the Junior Navigation Course is the Advanced Piloting Course.
