Boating Safety – Prepare for Safe Summer Boating

The sun is shining, the thermometer finally remains above the freezing mark. Summer boating is on our mind. Careful preparation is the key to a happy and safe boating summer.

If you took care of your boat before storing it for the winter, you won't need much work aside from the usual clean-up chores. However, to ensure the boat will be safe, a thorough inspection of the equipment is necessary. Make a checklist of all parts you should inspect.

Many items should be on your checklist. One of the important details is the inspection of your engine. Is the intake sea strainer free of corrosion? Fuel lines should not be soft or brittle. Check the fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters.

Does your rudder and do your steering cables move freely? Check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes. Do not overlook the control cables. Are cracks in the outer jackets?

The cables will need to be replaced.

Inspection of your electrical system may prevent an electrical fire on the water. Most fires are caused by the DC system. More expensive fires start in the AC system. With the addition of GPS and many more electrical devices, multiple batteries and a jumble of wires, a careful inspection of wires and connectors must be scheduled.

Look at your fire extinguishers. Are they outdated, do they need to be refilled or replaced? Check your flares. Replace outdated flares but keep the old ones aboard as spares.

Sailors should inspect the fittings, wire halyards and running backstays.

These are only a few items which need to be inspected. There are many more details not to be forgotten. Every boater knows his boat best, make a list of all the equipment you need to look at.

One very important part we often forget: Check your First Aid Kit! Are you prepared to handle small emergencies on board? Did you get a health checkup?

Let us prepare for a safe summer on the water!



📸 RUNNING FROM A SUMMER STORM

Using the summer months you can be sure of occasional storms. The only questions are at what time, how severe and for how long. They can sometime come up quickly; can have sudden high winds and a lot of lightning.

You should always check the weather forecast before going out as sometimes these storms will trick us. Do not rely on the TV weather or TV weather channels alone. I like to use two other sites to be sure. Check with NOAA and the national weather service on the internet or you boat's VHF radio.



Sometimes you find you just can't make it to home port and are faced with a choice of finding a friendly port, trying to outrun the front, hunkering down and riding it out. Sometimes a quick tie up at a nearby Marina or a stranger's dock may not be possible. Under these possibilities you might consider heading for a windward shore and riding the storm out until it passes.

A windward shore is the one in the direction from which the storm is approaching. The land mass and shoreline prevent the winds from building up and provides some protection. The opposite lee shore should be avoided at all costs. The wave action and heights will be at maximum towards the windward shoreline and you risk the possibility of being blown aground.

If you decide to hunker down, make sure you let out plenty of rode (anchor line). In storm conditions, you should have a minimum of ten feet of line out for every foot from the top of your deck to the water bottom. If it is ten feet deep and your deck is three feet high, this totals thirteen feet. At a ten to one ratio you will need one hundred and thirty feet of anchor line for some assurance your anchor will hold. Under no circumstances should you anchor only from the stern or with the stern into the wind. This increases resistance to the wind and leaves you susceptible to swamping over the transom.

If you can't get to safety, put your bow at an angle of 25 to 45 degrees into the wind and to control your engine speed to the minimum amount needed to hold your position or to barely move forward. You may feel the boat slip sideways or back as you do this. Just keep gently working the controls.

Remember to be wary of lightning at all times. A bolt can reach five miles ahead of a front. You should avoid touching metal parts of the boat whether topside or in the cabin. An anchor chain suspended from the railing overboard into the water may be used for a temporary grounding system.

What We Boaters Need Is On-the-water Training

fordable on-the-water training and certification is now a reality. The United States Power Squadrons® is now offering United States Coast Guard approved Boat Operator Certification Program. Who better to provide this on-the-water training than the organization with nearly 100 years of boating education experience, 32,000 members and 400 locations throughout the United States?

Boat Operator Certification is now recognized by organizations and agencies both in the United States and worldwide. There are already reports that some European countries, with very restrictive licensing regulations, are accepting the program's Coastal Navigator Certificate. Contacts are being made with the insurance and charter industries, as well as marine manufacturers to assure recognition.

The program has been offered at selected locations across the country since 2008. The two levels currently offered are: Inland Navigator and Coastal Navigator. The next two levels, Advanced Coastal and Offshore Navigator, are in development and will be released next year. *The program includes all aspects of boating from leaving and returning to a dock or slip, through offshore cruising.*

The entry-level certification, Inland Navigator, verifies an individual's basic boat handling skills for outboard vessels under 23 feet. Instruction begins in the classroom with courses and targeted seminars. *The practical boating demonstration components include: docking and undocking, low speed operation and high-speed maneuvers. For this boats between 15 and 19 feet are considered ideal.*


The second level, Coastal Navigator, certifies operation of vessels up to 20 miles off shore, which is the outer limit for ship to coast VHF communication. The applicant moves through other targeted seminars and the USPS Piloting Course. On the water portion of this level can be performed at any time during the process. The boater must prepare, plot, and then execute a route with at least four legs. *This level includes docking and anchoring instruction and demonstrations, with an emphasis on the use of a spring line for leaving a crowded dock.*

Advanced Coastal Navigation provides certification for up to 50 miles offshore or within one overnight at sea. This will be ideal for boaters wanting to travel between two ports, or perhaps boating in the Caribbean. *The final step, Offshore Navigator Certificate, extends the cruising range to ocean crossings and includes courses in celestial navigation as well as cruise planning and offshore vessel management.*
