Strawberry & Pepper Salsa

STAR GAZING

This months Lunar Phases started with the first quarter on May 30th, the Full Moon on the 7th known as the Strawberry Moon because strawberries are ready to be picked and eaten. The last quarter is on the 15th, the New Moon is on the 22nd and the first quarter of July's Lunar Phase is on the 29th of this month.

In our latitude we have a group of six constellations that are always above our horizon and can be seen all year long. Their positions change during the night as they circle around the North Celestial every 24 hours and they are known as "Circimpolar" constellations. The North Celestial Pole is the point in the sky in the Northern Hemisphere where an imaginary line is extended thru the Earths South and North Poles and extend into space. In our Hemisphere the line leads very close to a naked eye star called Polaris, aka The North Star or The Pole Star. Two more of the distinctive circumpolar constellations seen in our latitude are Cassiopeia, the Lady in the chair and Ursa Major, the Great Bear. In Ursa Major there is an asterism called the Big Dipper. An asterism is a conspicuous pattern of stars that are given a specific name in a constellation. Some examples are the sickle in Leo and the teapot in Sagittarius.

The bowl if the Big Dipper is the Great Bears back and rear end. The handle is the tail of the bear. It is a rather long tail for a bear's tail, but, according to legend the tail was stretched when this bear was hurled into space. The Big Dipper is a good signpost that makes it easy to locate some of the brighter stars on summer and the constellations they are part of. By using the labeled drawing of the Big Dipper you can locate the following stars: **Polaris, Cassiopeia, Mizar, Alcor,**Arcturus, Spica, Regulus, Capella, Vega, Altair and Denebin.

Extend a line from \underline{B} thru \underline{A} (known as the pointers) about five times the distance between these two stars and it will lead you to a fairly lonely white medium bright star, this is **Polaris**. All stars in the Northern Hemisphere appear to rotate around it and it lies within on degree away from true North.

Extending a line from \underline{E} thru Polaris to the northeast will bring you to five bright stars that form the letter W, these stars are on **Cassiopeia**. In the winter the W becomes the letter M.

Take a look at the star labeled \underline{Z} in the handle, this is actually two stars, the brightest is called **Mizar** and its dim companion is called **Alcor**. This star was used by the Arabs as a test of good eyesight. Squadron member and amateur astronomer Ray Nernday, JN named his boat *Mizar*.

Extending a line following the arc of the handle to the south will take you to the redish star **Arcturus** in Bootes. Moving along the same arc will lead you onto the bluest star in the sky, **Spica** in Virgo.

Extend a line from D thru G to the west and it will take you fairly close to the blue white star **Regulus** in Leo. It's the bottom star in the handle of the sickle. The bright yellowish object to the east of Regulus in the planet Saturn.

Extending a line from \underline{N} thru \underline{Z} to the northern horizon and it will lead you close to the white yellowish star **Capella** in Auriga.

Project a line from G thru D to the east and it will take you past the bright blue white star **Vega** in Lyra and on to the bluish star **Altair** in Aquila. To the north of these two stars on the bluish star **Deneb** in Cygnus. These three prominent stars make up the Summer Triangle.

BOATING SAFETY

False Distress Calls

When we take our boat out on the Great Lakes, it is reassuring to know that the Coast Guard is there to help in an emergency. We can all agree that having these trained professionals available to answer a mayday call gives us peace of mind each time we set sail.

But during the past few years a highly disturbing trend has emerged - a rise in a number of false distress calls. One third of the calls answered by the US Coast Guard on holiday weekends are often a hoax.

These false alarms are not harmless pranks. When the Coast Guard uses their resources to answer a false distress signal, less equipment and personnel are available to answer genuine emergencies on the lake. A hoax call might just put recreational boaters and Coast Guard personnel in harm's way for no reason.

Hoax calls do not just come over the radio. Firing flares in non-distress situations have the same effect - needlessly calling the Coast Guard out on a wasted trip.

Persons caught committing a hoax may receive a penalty of up to six years in prison and total restitution of expenses caused by the call as well as a \$250,000 fine.

Inform would-be pranksters of the consequences. Parents are responsible for the action of their minor children and should explain to them the dangers caused by thoughtless actions. Help prevent false may day calls and costly non-emergency calls!
