BOATING SAFETY

Enjoy a Safe Boating Season

This year the "North American Safe Boating Campaign" starts with the "National Safe Boating Week" May 16 to May 22, 2009. The intent of the campaign is to spread the message of safe and responsible boating and to heighten the awareness of the importance of always wearing a life preserver when near or on the water.



Boaters today have many options of using modern life jackets customized for many different water activities. They are comfortable and light weight.

More than 60% of boating fatalities result from capsizing, falling overboard or flooding. It is the sudden and unexpected in-water experience that can turn in a fatal situation. These deaths are preventable. Having lifejackets close at hand is not enough in case of an accident. Putting on a lifejacket once in the water is almost impossible, even if you are a good swimmer. The best precaution is to "Wear your Lifejacket" before you end up in the water.

Take care of your lifejacket. Periodically check that all the zippers, straps, ties, and snaps are in good working order. Attach a whistle and/or a small light to your life preserver.

Be prepared! I wish you a safe summer on the water.



STAR GAZING

This month the moon's first waxing quarter is on the 1st. The full moon on the 9th, is known as the 'flower moon" because of the many flowers that bloom this month. The last waning quarter will be on the 17th; the last waning crescent on the 22nd; and the new moon on the 24th. The first waxing crescent for next month's cycle is on the 26th.

The planets Mercury and Saturn are evening objects; Mercury will be close to the Sun and

will be only visible during the first week of this month. Saturn is the bright yellowish object in the constellation Leo. Look midway in the sky to the southeast, this planet will be visible all month. About an hour before sunrise, Jupiter will be paired with the crescent moon on the 19th. On the 21st, the red planet Mars, the crescent moon, and the dazzling bright Venus will form a triangle low on the southeast horizon in the constellation Pisces about an hour before dawn.

Between the 1st and the 8th, peaking on the 5th, the annual ETA-Aquarid Meteor shower will occur. Look to the east-southeast between 4:00am and Dawn toward the constellation Aquarius just above the horizon,, This is a fairly active meteor shower with swift brilliant meteors and persistent trains peaking at 20 to 30 per hour on the 5th. There will be some moonlight that will interfere with the fainter meteors, but overall this should be a good show. This shower is the result of the Earth passing through the dust and gas left behind by Halley's Comet which last passed our way in 1986.

Observers first reported this comet in 240 BC. However, it was not recognized as a predictable periodic comet [a comet that returns in less than 200 years] until the eighteenth century when astronomer Edmund Halley, after whom the comet is named, realized that several bright comets reported by previous observers over the cen-



tury were reappearances of the same comet. Halley's Comet returns every 74 to 76 years and is always bright enough to be seen with the naked eye. Its next visit to Earth will be in mid 2061.

June 19 – 21, 2009 District 10, 2009 Summer Rendezvous

The Village of Winneconne is located on the beautiful Wolf River, bounded on the north by Lakes Winneconne and Poygan, and on the south by Lake Butte des Morts. The village is only 10 miles from Oshkosh, 45 miles south of Green Bay, 90 miles north of Milwaukee, and is located in the heart of Wisconsin's vacation land. Due to the suc-

cess of the previous rendezvous here in 2005, the District Bridge plans on expanding the theme of affordable, fun for all the family, and boating activities.

The Friday night event will be an "Over the Transom" cookout competition, where each squadron will prepare their own favorite fare in the tailgating theme. The food will be judged by an impartial, but hungry, group of judges. You will need to bring your own means of cooking and food for this event, but bring enough to share. Prizes may or may not be awarded.

On Saturday we will have activities for members and guests, young and old, and this will probably involve some of you getting wet (note: car keys should not be in your pocket during any of these events!). Concurrent with the activities there will be BOC training for those wishing to complete their certification. We will be serving lunch, followed by more activities on the water, and in the evening there will be an event we like to call "Theatre in the Park". Hot Dogs, Popcorn, and Soda will be provided.

Bring tailgating equipment, chairs, and food, along with boats, water toys, swimsuits, and fishing equipment, to enjoy this wonderful weekend rendezvous. The park has a picnic area and facilities for boating, swimming, fishing, boat launching, and tie-up area, but no camping.
